

ART AWARDS AND PURCHASE PROGRAM

The Academy's art awards and purchase programs acknowledge artists at various stages of their careers. This year, nine participating artists will receive art awards. Additionally, paintings and works on paper are eligible for purchase and placement in museum collections nationwide through the Hassam, Speicher, Betts and Symons Funds. There are also purchase funds available for sculpture. Among the fifteen artists whose works were purchased and placed last year were Janice Redman (Eli and Edythe Broad Art Museum, MI), Robert Yasuda (Virginia Museum of Fine Arts, VA); McArthur Binion (Detroit Institute of the Arts, MI), Kyle Staver (Minnesota Museum of American Art, MN), June Leaf (Museum of Arts and Sciences, GA), Graham Nickson (Morgan Museum & Library, NY), and Richard Nonas (Seattle Art Museum, WA). Since the purchase program's founding in 1946, through the legacy of Childe Hassam, more than twelve hundred works have been purchased and donated to museums throughout the country. THE ACADEMY

The American Academy of Arts and Letters was established in 1898 to "foster, assist, and sustain an interest in literature, music, and the fine arts," and is chartered by Congress. Founding members include William Merritt Chase, Kenyon Cox, Daniel Chester French, Childe Hassam, Henry James, Theodore Roosevelt, Elihu Vedder, and Woodrow Wilson. Each year, the Academy gives approximately one million dollars in awards to artists, architects, writers, and composers. It presents exhibitions of art, architecture, and manuscripts, and subsidizes readings and performances of new musicals. The 119-year-old organization is located in three landmark buildings, designed by McKim, Mead & White, Cass Gilbert, and Charles Pratt Huntington, on Audubon Terrace at 155 Street and Broadway.
